RELAUNCHED PLAYER DISCIPLESHIP PROGRAM

We honed in on going deeper with **93 RBI Austin teens** through the relaunching of the Player
Discipleship Program as well as the continuation of
the Player Development Academy and the Mentor
Match Program.

These programs are worth celebrating because each one focuses on getting teenagers into deeper discipleship relationships with positive adult mentors! Children with mentors (compared to those without) are:

- 46% less likely to begin using illegal drugs
- 27% less likely to begin using alcohol
- 52% less likely to skip school

HOSTED A SAFE SUMMER LEAGUE

COVID-19 significantly limited our kids' ability to be active and to be in community. Isolation was one of the greatest concerns we heard from our RBI Austin parents.

While the scope of play was limited, we were able to provide a safe environment for **914 kids** to play ball and be connected to a team this summer.

LAUNCHED FAMILY BENEVOLENCE PROGRAM

With your support, we modified our service delivery model to meet critical needs of RBI Austin kids and families in new ways amidst COVID-19.

To help meet these needs, \$29,950 was given to launch the RBI Austin Family Benevolence Program that provided grocery store gift cards and laptops for online learning to 142 families serving 431 kids.
